## EX-SENATOR BOURNE TALKS ON GOOD ROADS

Makes a Hit With the Hillsboro Commercial Club

SPEAKER HAS FINE GRASP OF IDEA  
Wants Oregon to Have Sixteen Millions for Good Roads

Ex Senator Jonathan Bourne, Jr., to whom is due the credit for the enactment of the Parcel Post law, delivered an address before the Hillsboro Commercial Club, Monday evening, explaining his very comprehensive and elaborate plan for Federal aid to good roads. President George R. Bagley, of the Club, presided.

As outlined, the Bourne plan proposes that the several states shall be permitted to raise highway funds at the lowest possible rate of interest by utilizing the superior credit of the government. His plan is based upon the fact that the Government can borrow money at 3 per cent, while states must pay 5 per cent.

The suggested bill authorizes a billion dollar highway fund, apportioned among the several states in proportion to their area, population, assessed valuation and road mileage, each factor being given equal weight and no state being permitted to draw more than one-fifth of its share in any one year. When a state desired to use its share of the fund, it would issue its 4 per cent, 50-year bonds and deposit them in the Federal Treasury. Whereupon the Secretary of the Treasury would issue and sell at par a corresponding amount of U. S. 3-per cent, 50-year bonds and turn the proceeds over to the highway commission of the state for use in constructing roads under state laws and under state control. When the state paid its annual 4 percent interest, three-fourths of the amount would be applied to payment of the interest on the Federal bonds and one-fourth would be deposited in a sinking fund, which, with accumulation of interest thereon, would amount to the face of the bonds in a little less than 50 years. At the expiration of that time, if all interest payments have been made when due, the state bonds would be cancelled and returned to the state without any payment of the principal except as it is paid in the sinking fund taken out of the 4 per cent interest.

Under this plan, Oregon would get \$16,000,000. It is Mr. Bourne's idea that the states should extend the same plan to the counties. If Oregon should borrow \$16,000,000 of highway funds in the open market she would have to pay at least 4 per cent interest, which, in 50 years, would amount to \$33,200,000 and then she would have to repay the principal of \$16,000,000, making a total of \$49,800,000. Under the Bourne plan the total the state would have to pay would be the 4 per cent, a year or \$33,200,000, or a saving of \$16,000,000 as compared with sale of bonds in the open market. The saving would be still greater if comparison be made with sale of county bonds at 5 per cent.

But there is another advantage the state would gain. The plan provides that the government shall pay to each state annually for maintenance of roads a sum equal to 2 per cent of the amount the state has drawn for construction purposes, provided the state contributes an equal amount for the same purpose, it being estimated that the maintenance of a road costs on an average about 4 per cent of the cost of construction. If Oregon sold its bonds in the open market it would have to maintain roads without federal aid. Under the Bourne plan the state would receive \$32,000 a year from the government.

In addition to this financing feature, the Bourne plan provides for the establishment of a national academy of highway and bridge engineering at Washington, D. C., for the purpose of training men to take charge of permanent highway improvement, thus citing a large saving due to more efficient methods. To this school one student would be admitted from each Congressional district, the selecting being made by competitive examinations. Part of the student's work would be technical study and part of it practical work in the field. Each student would be paid his necessary traveling expenses in going to the school and enough money monthly to cover his actual living expenses, so that poor boys would be placed on an equality of opportunity with boys of wealthy parentage.

The Bourne plan avoids the danger of bureaucracy by providing for a national highways commission composed of the Chairman of the Senate and House Committees on Post Office and Post Roads and the Director of the Office of Public Roads, thus making the Bureau head a minority member of the Commission. Senator Bourne declared that the adoption of his plan and construction and maintenance of roads thereunder will add a hundred millions to the present hundred and forty billions of property values in the country, and effect an annual saving of a billion dollars through the saving of horse feed and keep because of the substitution of motor power
