NOVEMBER CIRCUIT COURT IN SESSION

Judge Campbell Appoints a Grand Jury, R. O. Stevenson as Foreman

MANY CASES SET FOR NEXT MONTH

Jurors Report Excepting One Out of Reach, and One out of County

The November term of circuit court convened Monday morning, with Judge Campbell on the bench.

The Court drew a grand jury, and appointed R. O. Stevenson as foreman, the other 6 being—Jens Peter Knudsen, Banks, R 2 James Morrissey, Cornelius Wm Behrman, N Tualatin Plains J C Ash, Cornelius, R 1 Mike Sushauer, Cornelius L Hellevyke, Farmington

The jury retired and commenced investigation of criminal charges which have accumulated since the last few weeks.

Judge Campbell held court this week up to yesterday afternoon. He set for trial the case of Terry vs Claekamas County, suit to recover for a demolished auto, near Milwaukee, case to begin Dec 22, the case of Miles Watrous vs Geo F Naylor, suit for \$25,000, alienation of wife's affection, will start Dec 5.

Board Expects to Raise About \$13,900 From the Levy Made

STATE AND COUNTY HELP TOTAL

District Will Pay Interest, Operating Expenses, and \$500 Debt

With over a million and half of property involved Saturday's school meeting was attended by seven or eight people.

A levy of eight and one-half mills was made on a valuation of a trifle over a million and half dollars worth of property.

The sum raised will pay interest on the bonds, conduct the school, and pay \$500 of the outstanding warrants, issued for finishing the new school's appliances.

The district owes \$45,000 bonds and \$3,500 warrant indebtedness.
