Threat Scalds. Burns or scalds affecting the throat become dangerous on ac-

count of the swelling produced, this latter result of the injury tending to excite symptoms of suffocation. Such accidents are not uncommon where children left to themselves have attempted to suck the vapor or steam issuing from the spout of a 2 bolling kettle. Where suffocation is feared sponges wrung out of hot water should be applied to the throat and the doctor instantly sent for in view of the possibility that an operation for opening the windpipe may be required. Small quantities of cod liver oil or olive oil may be given at frequent intervals by means of a spoon by way of acting as a soothing agent. *****************

LIKE A HUMAN SPHINX.

Lord Knollys Is Known as the Most Tactful Man In Europe.

"Europe's most tactful man" is, by common consent. Viscount Knollys, 1.rst Baron of Caversham, who is now ist seventy-six. For over forty years be was private secretary to British royalty, the friend and counselor of three monarchs, and his recent retirement was considered in court circles to be little less than a calamity. It has been said of him that "no

other man ever knew so much or said to little." The tribute is deserved, for Lord Knollys was always a human sphinx. Shrewd insight, unfalling tac; and courtesy and the rare ability to hold his tongue enabled him to win and hold the esteem and respect of not only those he directly served, but of cabinet ministers, diplomats and the people at large. Only the reporters disliked him, for never a word were they able to get out of him.

It was in 1808 that Francis Knollys. then merely a "Mr.," entered the serv ice of royalty as gentleman usher to Queen Victoria. Two years later be was appointed private secretary to the Prince of Wales, later King Edward -New York World.

A Liquid That Floats Stones. Of all liquids, mercury possesses the

greatest specific gravity, but another has recently been discovered which is also so heavy that stones of all kindsgranite, limestone, quartz, etc.-float in it. It is a saturated aqueous solution of tungstobornte. Its specific gravity is 3.3. whereas that of ordinary rocks does not exceed 2.7. Only a few precious stones have a specific gravity greater than that of this liquid. for which reason it is proposed to employ it for the separation of such stones from masses of broken rock.

New York's Great Channel. the deepening and widening of Ambrose channel leading into New York harbor is finished, except for a few minor details, and no further appropriations for construction will be needed This great artificial channel is seven miles long, 2,000 feet wide and forty feet deep at menn low tide. At night it is so brilliantly lighted by buoys that the largest ocean steamers can enter with perfect safety. The work was begun in 1901.

No Cure For Cancer Yet.

In his annual report Dr. E. F. Bashford, general superintendent of research in the laboratories of the imperial cancer research fund, told the members of the society that during the past year there had been twelve claims to the discovery of a cure for cancer All of these had been investigated and no justification for any one of these claims had been obtained. Dr. Bashford also said women were more tiable to cancer than men. In England and Wales in 1910 the death rate from cancer was 856 per million for men and 1.070 for women.

As the London Times says editorially in commenting upon this report, 'The only reasonable expectation of curing cancer still rests upon its complete removal by the surgeon at the earliest possible time after it is discovered"

New Words For China.

One of the most curious features of the awakening of China is the neces sity which has arisen for the addition of new words to the language. This does not mean merely names for such western importations as motorcars, aeroplanes, chematographs, etc., but words which have had to be invented to express ideas hitherto unknown to the Chinese mind. For instance, China had no indigenous word for "ident" Again, "reform" had to be built up as an entirely new word, as also "to take the initiative," "protection of life" and "educate" as different from "instruct" -instances which throw a vivid light on certain aspects of the Chinese tem-

Russia is inviting the attention of the men of letters of all countries to the fact that the most valuable literary prize ever offered is now open to competition. The subject appointed is a study of the life and work of Czar Alexander I. and the prize fund was de posited in the Rank of St. Letersburg by Alexander's minister.
