NINETEEN DISTRICTS VOTE SPECIAL TAX

Nearly Fifty Thousand Dollars For Permanent Roads

SOUTH HILLSBORO VOTED TEN MILLS

Five Districts in the Ten Mill Class. North Hillsboro Votes No

Nineteen road districts in Washington County the last of the week voted special road taxes for permanent roads meaning an expenditure of over \$48,000 the coming year for macadam and repair work. South Hillsboro district, Laurel, North Forest Grove and Dist. No. 42 and 45, all voted the 10 mills tax.

Quite a number of districts defeated a special levy. The district north of Hillsboro snowed under the affirmative overwhelmingly.
