Traveling men from all over the Northwest arrive in Hillsboro, and remark every day about the impression they receive in not seeing the festive canine wandering about at large. They say that it is a relief to get into a town where Mr. Dog is not sniffing around with an occasional yelp, and they are carrying the message to all the county seats on their routes.

John Herb, of Banks, was in town Saturday. His road district, No. 33, of which he is supervisor, had the largest road meeting reported in the county, 94 electors being out. The vote stood 61 to 33 for a six mill tax, and this money is to be expended on various sections of the road district, where rock will be placed in the stead of plank highways.

A. C. Kruger, of near Middleton, was in town Saturday. His road district, No. 43, of which he is supervisor, Friday voted a five mill tax for rock road purposes. He estimates that this will give him about \$1,000 for expenditure along this line. None of the tax was voted to apply to the much-mooted Rex-Tigard road, and Mr. Kruger says that as about 10 autos pass over the road to one farmer, he is pleased that the money is going elsewhere.

Franquette walnut trees grafted on California Black Root—the kind that grows vigorous and bears heavy crops here in Western Oregon. The tree mentioned in my former ad, topworked, 4 years ago last April, produced 125 pounds of dried nuts that can be sold easily for 20c per pound, wholesale, making an income of \$25.00. We have acres here in the northwest that are producing over \$300, net income, trees averaging less than 17 years old. It is time that Washington county was waking up to this new industry. My first and second plantings, 5 and 6 years old are beginning to bear.

UNION STOCK YARDS

Receipts for the week have been cattle, 757; calves, 18; hogs, 4330; sheep, 5144; horses, 103.

Cattle market holding steady for top quality, with steers selling at 7.50 for best stuff. More medium grade cattle were offered than choice. Cow stuff was about the same grade of poor quality that has been offered for some time, selling from 4.50 to 5.75, with just one lot selling for 6 cents. Prime light calves are worth 9, heavy ones 6 to 7.75. Bulls featured from 5.50 to 6.25. Stags steady.

A big run of hogs for the first of the week, but tops still held at 8 cents for three loads Monday and the week closed strong with fifteen loads for the open market and top quality still going at 8 cents and this price is apt to hold until stock show season. The show is billed December 9-13, and will attract shippers from the entire Northwest, and is the largest show ever held West of the Rockies.

Sheep receipts were increased from every Northwestern state this week, still the sum total was not exceptionally large, but what the run lacked in quantity it amply made up in quality. Prime ewes brought 4 again and choice wethers 4.75 to 5 for exceptional quality and lambs elicited a 6 bid with the market closing on a firm basis.
