WHO IS SURPRISED?

The new currency and banking bill is a revolution, inasmuch as it is a departure from the old regime in governmental law, touching upon the currency and money question. For ever so many years—in fact, ever since the Civil War—New York, or more concisely speaking, Wall Street, has been the godfather of our currency and monetary legislation. Those who were elected to the American Congress were wont to listen to the wise-heads in control of the New York banks—Benedict, Lazard, Freres, etals—and they were told that only in Wall Street were the genuine, Simon-pure, blown in the bottle financiers. So far as the old rank and file is concerned, that tale took deep root, and today we see Mann, and his ilk, prophesying disaster. But, let us turn to the country banker—for he tells the story. He is standing with his back against the wall, and telling you, my Mr. American, that the present bill is a good one. Why does he tell you this? Because he knows the current that came to him from New York, when he wanted to finance the horny-handed son of toil at harvest time—"you can get all the money you want from New York and Chicago—but you must pay interest, and a little more." So, then, New York and Chicago received all the profits of crop handling, and the country banker—and his name is legion—stood the expense of handling the year's crop with nothing but loss of stationery and time for his pains, while the big fellows received the centime per centime. Today the banker sees it—the banker out among the people who till the soil. They are for it, that currency bill of the present administration, and they know, better than anyone else, what it means to them. It is a sane, conservative, just and businesslike measure, and it pulls the fangs of those who want the "usufruct" of others' labors.

Christmas should have a double significance to Oregonians, this year, for there was never a better Summer's return since the state was first settled. There was an abundance of yield in all crops, and the price for everything the farmer has to sell is good.
