COUNTY COURT MAKES FIFTEEN NEW PRECINCTS

Names of All Come Very Near
Designating the Locality

GROVE AND HILLSBORO FOUR EACH

Beaverton and Cornelius Get Two Pre-
cincts Each Hereafter

Owing to the increase in the
voting strength caused by equal
suffrage the county commis-
sioners' court has created fifteen
new precincts. Hillsboro and
Forest Grove are divided each
into four voting divisions, while
Cornelius and Beaverton each
have two. The names of the
new voting subdivisions have
been changed so that in a way
each polling place is easily lo-
cated. The boundaries were es-
tablished this week, but the
meanders would be too lengthy for
publication. The names of the
precincts, and their locations, follow—

Cherry Grove, polling place
village of Cherry Grove.
Gaston, polling place, village
of Gaston.
Dilley, polling place, village of
Dilley.
Blooming, voting place, in set-
tlement of Blooming.
Laurel, takes place of South
Tualatin precinct, voting place
in village of Laurel.
Scholls, polling place, village
of Scholls.
Kindt, polling place, at or
near Kinton hall or school house.
Middleton, takes place of part
of one of the old Cedars, vote at
Middleton village.
Tualatin, takes place of part
of one of Cedars, vote at incor-
porated town of Tualatin.
Sherwood, portion of one of
Cedars, vote in town of Sher-
wood.
Mulloy, vote at Mulloy station,
on Oregon Electric.
Tigard, vote at Tigard station
or North Tigardville, as desig-
nated.
Garden Home, vote at Garden
Home junction, on Electric.
East Beaverton, vote in east
portion of town.
West Beaverton, vote in west
portion of town.
Aloha, vote at Aloha station,
S. P.—changed from Wheeler
precinct.
Reedville, vote at same old
polling place.
Hillsboro's four precincts are
N. E., N. W., S. E., and S. W.
Hillsboro, polling places given
later.
South Cornelius, vote in Cor-
nelius, south of Baseline.
North Cornelius, vote in Cor-
nelius, north of Baseline.
Verboort, vote at hall in set-
tlement of Verboort, near Cath-
olic Church.
Purdin, vote near the Ira Pur-
din ranch, in school house.
Forest Grove, like Hillsboro,
has four—N. E., N. W., S. E.
and S. W. Forest Grove.
Banks, polling place, at Banks
village.
Buxton, same old polling place.
Gales Creek, poll cast at Gales
City.
Timber, polling place, new
town of Timber.
Manning, taken from Buxton
and Banks, vote at Manning set-
tlement.
Mountain, remains practically
the same.
North Plains, vote at village
of North Plains.
Connell, vote at Connell sta-
tion, on United, this precinct
taken from Washington and old
Beavertown.
Oreono, vote in the Nursery
town.
Union, taking place of old Bea-
verdam, vote at the Union school
house.
