Frank S. Allen, Forest Grove, was sentenced to 11 months in the county jail, at Portland, Tuesday. The charge was white slavery, to which he pleaded guilty. A petition of 29 people was presented to the court, and the assistant district attorney, Mr. Johnson, recommended a light sentence, as the offense dated back over a year, and young Allen had been living properly since that time. Mrs. Dora Reed Barber, who worked on the case in conjunction with the sheriff's office, says that there were eight indictments against Allen, and that he pleaded guilty to No. 1, the remaining 7 counts to lay against him pending good behavior after he is released. She says that the evidence presented so clear a case that it was useless for Allen to fight it, hence the plea of guilty. She also says that the signers of the petition for clemency did not know the nature of the evidence against Allen. Mrs. Barber says that Allen was divorced from his wife, at Tillamook, in 1909, the complaint being that the husband tried to persuade her into a life in the underworld, and, with the decree, Mrs. Allen was given the custody of a minor child. The juvenile officer says that the U. S. charge against Allen was violation of the Mann act in taking Kate Raddie, alias Dora Hoffmann, from one state to another for purposes not moral.
