## STEEL TOWER FRAME INJURES TWO MEN

Old Structure Being Dismantled, Fell Yesterday, on Second Street

TWO LORSUNG BROS. FALL 100 FEET

Both Sustain Broken Legs and Narrowly Escape Death - Raising Easy

The steel tower frame, to the south, at the water and light office, fell yesterday afternoon, after an eye-beam had been disconnected, and the entire frame fell angling westward, 100 feet, to the roof of the distributing station. Joseph Lorsung Jr. and John Lorsung, brothers, sons of Jos. Lorsung Senior, rode the top of the frames to the roof of the station, and sustained broken legs. John had one leg broken near the knee joint, while Joseph Jr. sustained a bad fracture, half way between the knee and ankle. It seemed impossible that the men could have lived considering the force with which the steel frames fell.

Jos. Jr. was taken to Dr. Smith's office, where the fracture was reduced and John was taken to the home of his parents, where Drs. Erwin and Robb attended. Dr. Smith, and Dr. W. D. Wood, who assisted, do not think that Jos. Lorsung Jr. is internally injured, although at first it was thought that he was beyond hope. A few minutes after the fracture was set young Lorsung came to himself, and both the boys were resting easy at last reports.

The collapse came about two o'clock yesterday afternoon, while the funeral services of the late Dr. Linklater were being conducted.

Had the tower collapsed in a heap, it would have demolished the water and light office, where Mr. Jose is the book-keeper.

Mr. Boyain, of the Corporation, and Mr. Easter, superintendent, were in the distributing house when the crash came. Insulators crashed around them, and by a miracle they escaped injury. Mr. Easter rushed to switches and turned off the current, thus saving a possible fire.

The auto belonging to the company was in the path of the wreck, and it looks like it had passed through a Mexican battle.
