## ELDER STURDEVANT DIES AT CORNELIUS

Resident of Oregon and County For Thirty-one Years

### SAT IN FIRST OREGON CONFERENCE

Which he Helped to Organize for Advent Christians

The following, anent the life of H. S. Sturdevant, who died at his Cornelius home, last Friday, was handed in for publication:

"The sudden death of Elder H. S. Sturdevant, at his home in Cornelius, Oregon, Feb. 27, 1914, was a great shock to the community. He was an old timer in Cornelius, and held the universal love and respect of its citizens.

Coming of pioneer stock, he was, himself, a pioneer in the fullest sense of the word. Being a man of gentle and loving disposition, strong convictions, and



firm as the Rock of Ages, he was fitted by nature to become one of the hardy characters who blazed the trail for the westward march of civilization.

Elder Sturdevant was born in Wyoming County, Pennsylvania, August 19, 1818, in which place he grew to manhood, and on August 18, 1872, he was married to Miss Belle A. Johnson, and five years later emigrated to the State of Texas, then one of the wildest spots on the western frontier. Three years later he moved back to Pennsylvania, and in 1883 he started with his family on the long trail to Oregon, settling in the town of Beaverton, Washington County, the same year. Two years later he moved to a homestead in the northern part of Washington County, where being without roads, he packed in the provisions for his family on his back. In 1891 he sold his homestead, and bought a small place in Cornelius, where he lived at the time of his death. He was an ardent Christian, having united with the Baptist Church when 24 years of age. In 1888 he changed his beliefs to some extent, and united with the Advent Christian Church, under the preaching of Alonzo Dix, and later assisted in organizing the first conference of this Church in Oregon, in 1897, at Dille. He was licensed to preach in this Church, and the next year at Cornelius, he was ordained to the ministry, and under his preaching many were brought into the Church. He was a faithful worker in the Lord's Vineyard, and might truthfully say "I have fought a good fight."

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Belle A. Sturdevant, and five children as follows: Mrs. Edith Miller, of Portland; Monta Sturdevant, Cornelius; Mrs. May Dupray, Weiser, Idaho; Mrs. Bessie Hutchinson, North Plains, and M. L. Sturdevant, Cornelius. He is also survived by a brother in Kansas, and a sister in Pennsylvania, and nine grandchildren. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Alonzo Dix at the Methodist Church, the largest in Cornelius, but many were compelled to stand in the street for lack of room.—Written by a Contributor.

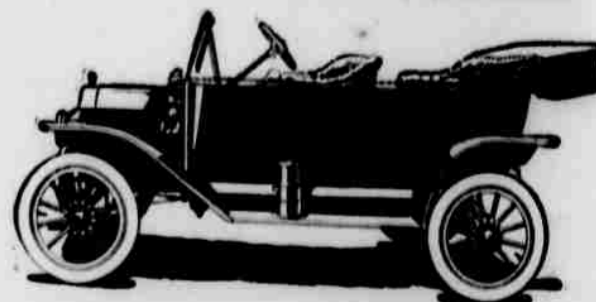
