JACOB T. GIBSON

Jacob T. Gibson, well known at Hillsboro, where he resided for many years, died Saturday night at his home, 406 Webster Street, Portland, from an attack of liver trouble. He was born at Dilley, Washington County, April 3, 1851, his parents being pioneers. In 1881 he was married to Eugenia Clements, at Hillsboro. His widow and one daughter, Mrs. Maud Story, survive. Of his immediate family he is survived by a brother, James, of Reedville; and two sisters, Mrs. Elizabeth Whitcomb, wife of L. L. Whitcomb, and Mrs. Eliza J. Wooly, of Portland, survive.

The funeral took place Tuesday, and interment was in the Masonic Cemetery. The pall bearers were Judge Archbold, J. C. Lamkin, F. J. Williams, R. H. Greer, Max Crandall and Manley B. Everitt.
