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MARCH CIRCUIT COURT OPENED ON MONDAY

Grand Jury Empanelled and Retired, Returning One True Bill

CAPT. COLLINS GRAND JURY BAILIFF

Thirty Jurors Responded to the Summons of the Commonwealth

Circuit court for Washington County opened Monday morning with Judge L. T. Harris, of Eugene, on the bench, sitting for Judge Campbell. Thirty jurors responded to the summons of the authorities, as follows: B. L. Doane, Chas. Farnham, O. P. Sheridan, John Olson, A. V. Denny, S. E. Graf, Wm. Thornburgh, Arthur B. Flint, Jos. W. Kyle, Geo. Sloan, W. P. Brooks, H. T. Buxton, Geo. C. Thompson, Edw. E. Morton, Harry A. Richards, John A. Oleson, Chas. Castrel, W. P. VanderZanden, A. W. Wright, John Wunderlich, Leo Schwander, Peter Grossen, H. W. McDonald, C. M. Seefeld, Ben Dooley, Ernest Olson, Fred Gordon, Henry Cop, Andrew Anderson and Jacob Shearer.

The grand jury was immediately drawn, with H. T. Buxton as foreman, Bert Doane, A. B. Flint, W. P. VanderZanden, Henry Cop, John Wunderlich, and Harry A. Richards, and they soon retired under charge of Capt. A. M. Collins, who was appointed bailiff. One true bill was found and the jury then adjourned upon call of the district attorney.
