PAY ATTENTION TO REGISTRATION

County Clerk Luce Suggests That There is Likely to be Mixups

ADVISES ALL TO WATCH LOCATION

A Little Care Now Will Make Mistakes Impossible Primary Day

Clerk Luce wishes to suggest to voters of the county that they be very careful when registering that they are booked for the precinct in which they reside. There are so many new precincts, and the boundary lines have been so changed, that one is likely to be registered in a precinct otherwise than his own. Each notary that is registering voters, and each justice that is performing this rite, has a map. The County Clerk says that with a little care at this time it might save one the annoyance of having to swear in on blanks. Several have already registered in the wrong precinct, and if you are not sure as to your location it might be wise to see your registering officer and find out where the land lays.

In some places the new boundaries cut through sections, and here is where there is likely to be trouble. Again, many think they are in the old precincts, when the new sub-divisions place them in another. It will be well to look this up before you register, or to see if your registration is right if you have been signed up.
