

"MAN OF THE HOUR" AT THE CRESCENT

Dramatic Fraternity Have Good Attendance at Successful Play

NEW TALENT ON STAGE FRIDAY NIGHT

Broadhurst's Success Given Recognition to Appreciative Audiences

Geo. Broadhurst's play, "The Man of the Hour," in four acts, was staged by the Hillsboro Dramatic Society at the Crescent Theatre, last Friday evening, to an appreciative audience. The production was directed by E. L. Moore, and the plot of the play is instructive of politics in American cities where graft runs riot. The moral of the story is that one man, true to himself, can forestall graft if he shall have singleness of purpose, coupled with determination. Geo. McGee, as Alwyn Bennett, a mayor elected by two unscrupulous politicians, grew large with his lines, and finally emerged from trying circumstances with flying colors. Geo. Emmott fittingly carried the character of Chas. Wainwright, traction millionaire, who was playing both ends of a franchise and using the city administration for gain. J. C. Applegate, as the big political boss, who never knew defeat until the new mayor was elected, made an excellent Horgan, and Jas. Jose, as Gibbs, on the side lines as the real villain, was an able second. L. C. Boyatt, as Phelan, the politician who wanted to get even with Horgan, was good. W. N. Harris, as Perry Wainwright, a nephew of the traction magnate, afforded the comedy, and always caught the audience with his sallies. W. W. Boscow, as Judge Newman, the court who always had his orders from the grafters, and obeyed them, but who was always in love with his wife, told the story of judicial perjury. Dr. Marshall, as the crooked alderman who finally went right, and Roy Heater, as one of the political lieutenants, handled their lines nicely. Chas. Lange handled the reporter end, and as Arthur Payne, representing the press, was always on the works. Miss Ruth Harbison, as Dallas Wainwright, whose fortune was injected into the crooked deal by her uncle, was the heroine, and after becoming engaged to Gibbs, the conspirator represented by Jose, finally found the honest mayor to her liking, even though his beating the combine wrecked her financially, was more than clever. Miss Lucy Weathered, as Cynthia Garrison, secretary of the mayor, was excellent. Mrs. Jas. Jose, as the mother of the mayor, was at her best advising her son to stay with the right. Barney Lewis, as the doorkeeper of the old school, was true to the character. Kenneth Robb, as secretary of the magnate, came to his climax when he made himself known as the son of a man who had been financially ruined by the elder Wainwright. Will Will, as Mills, the butler, completed the cast.

Taken all in all Mr. Moore is to be congratulated on the success of the play.

OVER THIRTEEN MILES OF MACADAM TO BUILD

County Court Will do Considerable Permanent Road Work

PORTLAND-HILLSBORO GAP CLOSE

District No. 6 Will be the Premier in Length of Rock Work

The campaign for rock road work will soon begin for the season of 1914. District No. 6, Nels Larsen, supervisor, will be the leader of all the districts in the matter of lineal measurement of macadam, the palm going to this division with 15,000 feet—nearly three miles.

The Hillsboro-Beaverton road will have the gaps nearly all closed when the work shall be completed this Fall, leaving but a very small mileage of dirt road between the county seat and Portland. The Hillsboro-Laurel road will get over two miles of macadam, in two districts. Aside from Hillsboro District No. 6, the Helvetia district No. 45, Alfred Pieren, supervisor, will have the greatest lineal stretch, as 10,660 feet of rock road will be built in the vicinity of Connell station on the United. The total measurement of all macadam works for which bids are asked totals 13.44 miles, and it will mean distribution of quite a sum of money, now laying in the treasurer's office, collected on this year's tax.

JUDGE CAMPBELL SETS FOUR CRIMINAL CASES

Gerhard Tholin Pleads Guilty to Uttering Spurious Check

WILL BE SENTENCED NEXT MONDAY

Frank Scott and Guy Porter Arraigned and Dates of Trials Set

Judge Campbell came out Monday morning, and disposed of some calendar business. Gerhard Tholin, charged with passing a bad check on Frank Jensen, at Timber, some months back, pleaded guilty. Tholin is a young man, and his attorney, W. G. Hare, asked for leniency from the court, and sentence was deferred until next Monday.

Guy Porter, charged with obtaining money from North Plains farmers, will plead April 20, and his trial has been set for April 22.

Frank Scott, charged with a statutory offense, pleaded not guilty, and his trial was advanced on the calendar to April 23.

John Doe Peterson, charged with illicit sale of liquor, will have his trial April 21.

State versus Donahue, larceny by bailee, will be tried April 24. The case of Henry Meyer versus Harry Davies will be heard next Monday.

The cases of Scott and Porter are new ones, the indictments having but recently been made public. Porter was caught down at the Mexican line, while Scott was picked up at Eugene.

The decree in the case of Smock versus Bailey was modified, upon motion of counsel.

Bernards versus Hollis, and McKenzie versus Vickers were both dismissed.

Judge Campbell will be back again Monday, and the jurors will be in attendance.
