NO REPUBLICAN OUT FOR SHERIFF

Clerk Luce Closes Books Yesterday—Not Many Candidates Out

Candidates are this year few and far between. Only in two offices is there a contest—recorder of conveyances and county commissioner, there being two each for these positions. There is no republican candidate for sheriff, Mr. Reeves, on the democratic ticket being the only man running in the primaries.
