### P. H. McENERY DEAD IN LANE, CENTERVILLE

Found by Milk Haulers, Early Last Friday Morning, April 17  
WAS OLD TIME NEWSPAPER EDITOR  
Conducted Cornelius Tribune for Two or Three Weeks

P. H. McEnery, aged between 40 and 50 years, was found dead by milk haulers last Friday morning in a lane, near the Sam Moon place. McEnery had been working on the publication issued by Father LeMiller, at Verboort, after he had suspended publication of the Cornelius Tribune, which he issued several weeks, succeeding Lawrence Fernsworth. McEnery was a clever writer when at his best, but for some years had been addicted to the use of opiates, as well as being a hard drinker. For three years he was city editor of the San Jose Mercury, a California newspaper of importance. He was highly educated, but lost his position through the use of drugs. Drifting to Oregon he worked on a Klamath Falls paper, and upon leaving Klamath was sent to the State Hospital for a short time, where he was treated. Upon release he drifted to Oregon City and Portland, and last Summer secured a position with the Hillsboro Independent.

McEnery is said to have a family in the South. Coroner Barrett and Sheriff Reeves went to the scene of the death Friday afternoon, and after the investigation the body was brought to Hillsboro by Undertaker King. McEnery had been stopping at Verboort, and left the parish house Thursday afternoon for North Plains, where he was seen late in the afternoon. He evidently started home late in the evening, and must have reached the lane in question at a late hour. Sam Moon Jr. passed through the lane just before midnight, and says his buggy wheel ran over something which he thought was a stick of wood. The body showed where the wheel had run over it. An auto also passed, but had missed the prostrate form. McEnery's hat was about 100 feet away. The body was in the center of the road, and was not very cold, indicating that he must have died late in the night—probably long towards morning. It is possible that he was intoxicated and was still alive when the buggy ran over him. There was no injury to the body, and no marks indicating that a collision had taken place. Coroner Barrett and Dr. Erwin concluded there was no necessity for an inquest.

Touching upon the theory that an automobile had struck McEnery, Dr. Erwin says there was but one abrasion—and that a slight one—on the body, and that was near one of the knees, and this was possibly done by the buggy wheel. No shoulder was broken, as claimed in common rumor. Boys at the Schiefelin place say that McEnery passed there about 7:30 in the evening, and he was then throwing his hat in the air, giving it an occasional kick as it came to terra firma.

Dr. Calvin S. White, of the State Board of Health, sends out a bulletin giving information as to the proper action when a dog is supposed to have rabies. He says not to kill the dog, but to pen him up and watch him. Dr. White says that a dog affected with rabies can not live over nine days—that being the limit, if he is inoculated. Any person who has been bitten by a dog need have no fears of his safety if the canine lives beyond this limit of time. The wound should be cauterized with nitric acid and dressed with antiseptic, and a dressing of quinine would be ideal. If the dog shows symptoms of rabies and must be killed to prevent disaster, the Dr. advises that he should not be shot through the head as the seat of rabies is in the brain. This makes examination more satisfactory and speedy, and gives the physician a chance to find out whether or not a person needs treatment without delay.

### FORECLOSURE OF \$30000 FILED IN CIRCUIT COURT

J. W. Shute Brings Action on Loan on Timber Lands in County  
MORTGAGOR IS KINNEY, SPECULATOR  
Valuable Holdings in North Washington County in Litigation

One of the largest foreclosures ever filed in Washington County was brought in circuit court, last week, the plaintiff being John W. Shute, of this city, for years in the banking business. The suit is for foreclosure of 2,450 acres of timber lands in North Washington County, and it is said that the timber on the various tracts is of the best in that section. There are 17 tracts in all, and the bulk of it is easy of access.

The note on which suit is based was given March 25, 1912, and the principal was for \$33,701.75. The complaint asks for the principal, for interest from date of draft of the note; \$3,000 attorneys fees; \$31.34, taxes for 1912; \$27.75 for taxes paid the last year; and for interest on the various amounts from date of paying the money.

The note on which the mortgage was based was for ten months, and not a dollar of principal or interest has ever been paid according to the allegations of the pleadings. Bagley & Hare are the attorneys for Mr. Shute.
