HILLSBORO GRANGE IS AFTER ECONOMY

Wants Reduction of Taxes and Less Commissions and Deputies
WILL REDUCE EXPENSES EVERYWHERE
Pledge Not to Support Anyone Who Will Not Lessen Burden

Hillsboro Grange, Patrons of Husbandry, has thrown down the gauntlet for less taxation, and at a recent meeting adopted the following resolution:

"Be it resolved by the Hillsboro Grange No. 73, P. of H.—That, inasmuch as our taxes are getting to be a grievous burden and that there is general dissatisfaction with, and much criticism of our tax laws, and the amount of salaries and number of deputies of our officers and the number of deputies of our officers and the number of commissioners, game and fire wardens, and other expensive officials—

Be it further resolved: That the voters of Hillsboro Grange pledge themselves not to vote for any candidate for the state legislature who will not first pledge himself to introduce a bill and work for its passage through the legislature to lessen our taxes by curtailing expense along the lines above mentioned:

And that we respectfully ask all Granges and taxpayers in the state of Oregon to join with us in this pledge.

Be it further resolved that a copy of these resolutions be sent to the Hillsboro papers and also to the Daily Journal and Weekly Oregonian."

LECTURE

(Contributed)

Hillsboro Council of the Knights of Columbus has completed arrangements for the lecture on Christianity versus Socialism, which is to be given by Mr. David Goldstein of Boston, May 8, in the court house. Mr. Goldstein is a trade unionist, having played an active part in the Cigar Makers International Union, in which he proudly boasts that he holds a 25-year-old card. As a delegate to the Mass. State Convention of the American Federation of Labor he was instrumental in having the first positive pronouncement passed by a State Convention of trade unions against the propaganda of Socialism within the trade union movement, and the Socialist attempt from without to destroy the legitimate unions of labor by the organization of the Industrial Workers of the World.

There is no doubt that Mr. Goldstein knows his subject and knows how to tell others what he knows. In a good, clear, capable manner he presents his reasons why the American people should take a decided stand against Socialism. "The Bulletin" of Oberlin, Ohio, which has followed Mr. Goldstein's career on the lecture platform, says: "Wherever Mr. David Goldstein has lectured he arouses the anger of the Socialists, who invariably flock to hear and quiz him, with the hope of causing embarrassment to the speaker, but in every instance Mr. Goldstein has met the enemy, disclosed their tactics and completely defeated them. As a lecturer he is grand, but it is in answering questions of all kinds that would confuse and defeat the average orator, that he is supreme, yes, unequalled. This has been often acknowledged by people who themselves are no novices in this work."

He will answer all questions. Last Saturday the members of the G. A. R. and W. R. C. met in Odd Fellows Hall for their usual monthly social time. The afternoon was spent in visiting and a program, about 60 being present. Light refreshments were served at the close. The program was as follows. Song, America, by assembly; recitation, Helen Vaught; piano solo, Miss Della Barnicott; song, Mr. Sias; instrumental music, B. K. Haines and Raymond Beeler; reading, J. L. Crow, piano solo, Mrs. Bessie Jones; five minute talk by Judge Crandall. 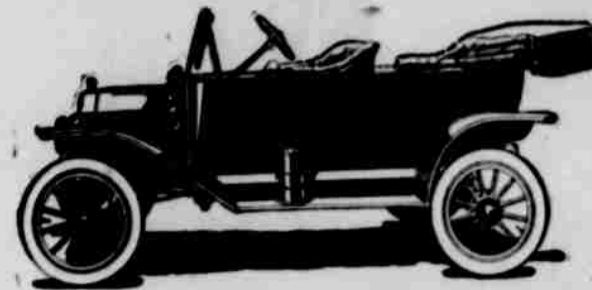
