

# BANKERS IN GROUP 1 AT HILLSBORO MEETING

Financiers Guests of the Four County Seat Banking Houses

ENDED BY BANQUET AT WASHINGTON

Visitors Highly Pleased With the Way They Were Treated

The bankers of Group One, Oregon, were entertained in their annual convention by the four banking houses of Hillsboro, last Saturday, and a representation of about sixty were in attendance.

The visitors were received by the following committee: A. C. Shute, of the American National; Willis Ireland, of the Hillsboro Commercial; David Kurath, of the Hillsboro National, and W. Mahon, of the Shute Savings.

W. S. Wharton, of Newberg, presided over the session. Mayor H. T. Bagley welcomed the visitors on their arrival, and E. W. Haines, of Forest Grove, responded. Addresses were made by George E. Frost, of R. G. Dun & Co.; Lydeil Baker, of the Pacific Banker; J. L. Hartman, of the Portland Clearing-House Association, and Alex Martin, of Eugene. A question box and discussions followed.

The bankers generally sounded an optimistic note and many told of the resumption of industries.

A resolution was unanimously adopted endorsing A. J. Mills, of the First National Bank, Portland, for selection as one of the directors in Class C for regional bank No. 12 at San Francisco, and it was voted to telegraph the endorsement to Washington.

Officers were elected as follows: W. S. Wharton, Newberg, chairman; Leroy D. Walker, Canby, vice-chairman; Paul S. Dick, of the United States National, Portland, secretary; W. M. Ross of St. Helens, treasurer; Erwin Harrelson, Tillamook; W. H. Wehrung, Hillsboro; C. R. Higgins, Astoria, and E. W. Haines, Forest Grove, executive committee.

After the session closed at 4 p.m. the visitors were taken to Forest Grove and the Oregon Nursery, at Orenco, to give them an idea of our resources, the parties going in autos. At 6:30 the party repaired to a splendid banquet at the Hotel Washington. W. H. Wehrung presided as toastmaster, and the Ad Club quartet, of Portland, favored the diners with several selections, several of which were laden with local color.

Rev. Harris' response to a toast was a gem. Others who responded were J. W. Bailey, of the Commercial; A. C. Shute, of the American National; J. A. Thornburgh, of the Forest Grove National; Mayor H. T. Bagley, and John M. Wall.

The banquet was one of the finest ever served in the city, and Manager Gifford received many congratulations.
