FOREST GROVE HAS TROUBLE OVER DOGS

Attempt to Follow County Seal Ordinance Stirs up Strife

BIG PETITION TO REPEAL "THE-UP"

Council Lays Request on Table and Many are Wrath Over it

Some trouble has been the result of Forest Grove passing an ordinance prohibiting dogs from running at large. This action was taken several weeks ago, and dog owners have been protesting against the measure. Last week a large petition was presented to the council, asking for a repeal of the local law, and the request was continued, much to the chagrin of the movers, and some of the excited ones are in favor of a recall.

Hillsboro passed just such an ordinance a year or so ago, and at first there was some objection. These, however, have subsided, and it is hardly likely that any great percent of the citizens would revert back to the old order of allowing "Fido" and "Tige" to roam at will on inspection tours over the city.

That Hillsboro has been satisfied with the ordinance, in the main, goes without saying, and if Forest Grove should keep the measure as law it will be approved by a large majority of citizens—that is, if it works out the same as it did in Hillsboro.

FARMINGTON GETS STEEL STRUCTURAL

County Court Concludes Steel Bridge is Economy in Long Run

COAST BRIDGE CO. GETS AWARD

Eighty-Foot Span With Caissons Costs County Sum of \$3936

The county court met Saturday and opened bids for the Farmington bridge, and for the fill at the Hays place, near Sherwood. There were but two bids on the Farmington work, one on a steel bridge and one for a wooden structure. The bid for the wood bridge was put in by J. S. Lorusung, whose figures are \$1720.85.

The Coast Bridge Co., of Portland, put in a bid to erect a steel bridge, covering the piers and the eighty-foot span for \$3,936, and after deliberation the court held that the steel structure would be the more economical of the two, and the award was given accordingly.

The Coast Co's manager, who was here Saturday, says that the bridge will be completed within 30 days from the time the bond was filed, which was Monday of this week.

There were several bids on the fill at the Hays place, near Sherwood, E. R. Herndon getting the award at \$726.

In the matter of the steel structure, five plans were submitted, the company offering to put in the span, the county to put in the piers, at the upset price of \$1900; another plan of bridge, complete, for \$3518; another for \$2768 and still another plan of bridge for \$3186. The court decided that the award accepted was the best value.
