FOUR HUNDRED PER MONTH FOR PENSIONS

Washington County Draws Warrants for \$408 Monthly to Widows TWENTY-TWO NOW ON PENSION LIST

Mrs. Viola Russell Draws the Highest Budget—\$55 Each Month

Washington County now has a widows' pension list of twenty-two, and the monthly roll amounts to \$408. At this rate the annual roll would amount to \$4,896—a little less than \$5000.
