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THE McNULTY ESTATE DOES NOT ESCHEAT

Goes to Thos. McNulty, Brother, in Ireland, and Two Others

THE JURY FINDS THERE ARE HEIRS

Estate Embraces Twenty Thousand Dollars in Gross Value

The jury in the McNulty estate mention of which is made in another place in this issue, found that there are heirs to the estate and the State of Oregon will not get the property. This means that Thos. McNulty, of Ireland, and Kate McNicholas and Mary McAndrews, of Ashland, Pa., are the heirs, in accordance with the order of Judge Goodin, and they will receive the estate, valued at over \$20,000. Bagley & Hare were the attorneys for the heirs in Pennsylvania, and Marlarkey, Seabrook & Stott, for the heirs in Ireland. Jay Upton and John M. Wall, special counsel for the state, represented the governor before the court.

There is some little cash and the balance of the estate is at Cipele, consisting of rich garden lands.
