PORTLAND OFFICERS GET MRS. JOHNSON

Wife of Prisoner Mills, at Jail

Little Twelve Year 014 Daughter Woman Tells Wierd Story

Mrs. Frank Johnson, formerly of and then a resident of California. was taken to Portland Monday evening in response to a call from the Multnomah County officials. Just what the charge is against the woman is not known. but it may be for contempt of the Juvenile Court, and it may be some other and more serious charge, Mrs. Johnson has a twelve year old daughter a bright little creature and the girl has been taken over by Dora-Reed Barber, the Juvenile Court official at Forest Grove, Mrs. Johnson has posed as the wife of Prisoner Mills, in the county jail, and the officials say they have never been married. The child has been physically maltreated, and is in a horrible condition, and the little girl says the mother is responsible, A janitor, of Portland, is under arrest on the case, and other arrests may follow.

The woman in question has been making life a misery for the sheriff's office for several weeks, hanging about the place n order to talk with Mills. She s now in care of the matron at the Multnomah jait, and what will develop later is a matter of conjecture.
