SECOND: That a money judgment be entered for the sum of Five Hundred Forty Dollars (\$540) and interest from March 1, 1914, until paid, at the rate of eight (8) per cent per annum, and for the further sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200) as attorney's fees and plaintiff's costs and disbursements against the defendants, A. L. Harrison and Phoebe Harrison, his wife, in favor of the plaintiff herein.

THIRD: That a money judgment be entered for the sum of Five Hundred Forty Dollars (\$540) and interest from March 1, 1914, until paid, at the rate of eight (8) per cent per annum, and for the further sum of Nine Hundred Fifteen and 29-100 Dollars (\$915.29) together with interest from January 1, 1914, at the rate of six (6) per cent per annum until paid, and for the further sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200) as attorney's fees, and for plaintiff's costs and disbursements against the defendant, Arthur G. Harbaugh, and in favor of the plaintiff.

FOURTH: That a money judgment be entered for the sum of Two Hundred Seventy Dollars (\$270) and interest thereon from March 1, 1914, at eight (8) per cent per annum until paid, and for the further sum of Four Hundred Fifty-seven and 64-100 Dollars (\$457.64) and interest thereon until paid from January 1, 1914, at the rate of three (3) per cent per annum, and for the further sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100) attorney's fees, and for one half plaintiff's costs and disbursements and against the defendant, W. H. Merrick, and in favor of the plaintiff.
