REGISTRATION WILL CLOSE SATURDAY P. M.

List Will Run to Eighty-Five Hundred, Says Clerk Luce

LARGEST IN HISTORY OF COUNTY

Even at That There Will be Many Who Will Vote on Blank "A"

County Clerk Luce states that in all probability the registration, which will close Saturday night, will run close to 8,500 voters, and even then there will be many who will not get in the registry books, and will be obliged to vote Blank A.

Registration will not close until 5 p. m. on the 17th, and tomorrow and Saturday will be busy days for the clerk's office, and for registration officers in the county at large.

It is estimated that the number of women registering will more than total the 3,000 mark, and may go to 3,500.

Election supplies are pouring in, and the work of getting up the ticket is now under way.
