Nordin Asks for Big Sum for Personal Injuries While at Work

A state-wide campaign against the Dentistry Bill is being waged by laymen and dentists under the leadership of the Oregon Society for Dental Education. Co-operating with this organization are members of the Oregon Congress of Mothers, members of Parent-Teacher Associations, the State Federation of Women's Clubs, and other welfare, civic and commercial organizations.

The campaign has taken the form of a welfare movement and numbers among its supporters such men and women as Dr. William T. Foster, president of Reed College; Dr. Fletcher Homan, president Willamette University; Mrs. Sarah A. Evans, president of the State Federation of Women's Clubs; Mrs. Millie R. Trumbull, secretary of the Child Labor Commission; Miss Eva Emery Dye, editor of The Conquest; and other men and women prominent in educational and welfare work.

It is urged that the bill threatens the educational and moral standard, not only of the dental profession, but of law, medicine, optometry, and other professions and trades that have to do with public health. The lowering of the standard of one means an ultimate effort to lower the standard of all.

The Dentistry Bill would license a dentist with a diploma from a college having a dental course of only two years of six months each and would require no State examination. There is not a reputable dental college in the United States with such a course. All standard colleges require at least three years of nine months each.

A veterinary surgeon in Oregon must be a graduate from a recognized veterinary college that has a course of at least three years of nine months each and must take a State examination.

A barber in Oregon must have a special preparation of three years of nine months each.

Labor Unions require a printer to serve an apprenticeship of four years; carpenters, three years; machinist, four years; plumbers, four years.
