AUGUST KRAUSE

August Krause, an esteemed pioneer of this county, died at the Gardner Sanitarium, Hillsboro, November 20, 1914, after an illness of over a year. He was born at Gervin, Pommernia, Germany, Jan. 8, 1848. He served in the Franco-Prussian War of 1870-1, in the German army, and was at the siege of Paris. After discharge with honors he emigrated to America, and settled on the plains of Minnesota. He left Minnesota on account of the rigorous Winters, and landed in Washington County in 1877, purchasing a quarter section south of Cornelius, and had made his home here continuously ever since. He was a man of the strictest integrity, and held to the honor of the old school. He was well read, had advanced ideas on economic and other questions, and was a good conversationalist. Being a veteran of the German army he was intensely interested in the present struggle in Europe.

The funeral services were conducted at Blooming by Rev. L. Stuebe, A. Hergert Sr., H. Voelker and H. Kamna, P. Ruecker, C. Kraemer and J. Schoknecht acting as pall bearers.

Mrs. Krause passed away in September, 1913. Three children mourn his loss—August, Gustav and Emma, all residing at Blooming.

MRS HENRY BROCKS

Mrs. Johanna Brocks, wife of Henry Brocks, of South Tualatin, died at the family home, Nov. 23, 1914, aged 67 years, 9 months, 11 days. She was born in Germany Feb. 7, 1847, and was married to Mr. Brocks Nov. 23, 1868. She came to America 28 years ago, and husband and wife settled in Oregon, going on their farm 25 years ago last July. Mrs. Brock lived to see the 4th generation in her immediate family. She is survived by her husband and seven children: Mrs. Jos. Wilke, Mt. Angel; Mrs. G. D. Michel, Portland; Mrs. Alois Mayr, San Francisco; E. J. Brocks, Antelope, Ore.; Mrs. John Reinke, Mountaine; Mrs. Arthur Miltenberger, Hillsboro, and Miss Etta Brocks, at home. The funeral takes place Thanksgiving Day.
