An accountant sends in a bill of \$1273.33 for services in expediting the county books for 9 months. He finds that all money, except a dollar here and there, has been properly accounted for. The report finds things generally in healthy shape—but it would appear that the sum of nearly \$1300 is a mighty fine price to pay experts whose work could just as well have been done—and has been ably done—for for less than \$300. This expediting has been done under the new state law. The court should scale this bill down to just proportions, and then pay it. And then, when the Washington County delegation gets to Salem it should proceed to—and they no doubt will—knock several kinds of whey out of the law. It is unhealthy, and is one of the various reasons why taxation is so high. Kill off the bill, and let us expert our own books. Washington County pays its state tax for state purposes, and the state always gets it. Let the county take care of its own business and pay prices within the

bounds of reason for expert services.
