

# NEAR FORTY THOUSAND VOTED FOR ROCK ROADS

## Twenty-One Districts Declare for Special Road Tax for 1915

### DISTRICT SIX VETOED NO TAX

Expected That With General Tax Assistance 15 Miles Will Build

The returns are all in from the various road district tax meetings, and a total of 21 districts have voted special taxes for building permanent roads. Many of the districts which have voted the tax will ask the county to take the largest portion of the general road tax and add to the rock road tax, and in this manner, with a little volunteer work here and there, at least 15 miles, if not 17 miles, of macadam road will be the marker for the year 1915. District No. 1, which held a big campaign for rock roads last season, voted against a special tax.

Maybrick has been in jail for some time, failing to give a bond on the threat to kill, and also facing the larceny charge for which he received the penitentiary sentence. Margaret Pilkington sues B. F. Pilkington for divorce, alleging marriage in 1877, and that the husband has several times deserted her without notice, returning after lengthy absences. She says she worked to support the children and that Pilkington would become angered when she refused to give him money. They own 3 acres at North Tigard, and she wants title and \$20 monthly alimony.

# JAMES MAYBRICK SENTENCED TO PEN

## Husband Gets 1 to 7 Years, and Divorce Summons in one day

## STOLE TOOLS FROM TIGARD OFFICE Had Also Threatened to Kill His Father-in-Law

James Maybrick, who has been in the county jail several months, pleaded guilty to larceny from an office, Tuesday, and was sentenced to an indeterminate term of from one to seven years by Judge Campbell, Tuesday. The offense took place at Tigard, where Maybrick lived, and where he kept things in a state of turmoil for some weeks, with his wife's family, having at one time threatened to kill the paternal ancestor of his wife. After that Maybrick entered a building, stole some saws, paint, and other material and then headed in at the county jail.

## Concurrent with his sentence Maybrick received a summons from his wife, who has sued him for divorce. The two, coming at the same time, made things look rather dark for the prisoner, but when he was taken to Salem, today, he had regained his debonaire manners, and was ready to meet all comers.

## EXPERTS' REPORT

Arthur Beveridge has filed the experts' report for auditing the county books from Jan. 1, 1914 to Sept. 30, 1914. The report is voluminous, and finds things generally in good shape, with no charge of graft. It kicks, however, at the charge of 25 cents per meal for prisoners, the average being three prisoners per week, according to the jail register. This would mean, then, about \$40 per year excess of payment on the total of board. The court some years ago tried the \$5 per week deal, with the result that the administration concluded to have the sheriff's office feed the charges.

# PUBLIC DEDICATION OF CARNEGIE LIBRARY

## Exercises Will be Held at Building, Dec. 9, 8 p. m.

## INSTITUTION PRESENTED TO CITY Program Will be in the Library and Reading Room

The Hillsboro Carnegie public library will be dedicated with appropriate exercises Wednesday evening, Dec. 9. The building for the first time will be opened to the public, and an opportunity for inspection given. The exercises will be held in the library and reading room, the program beginning promptly at 8 o'clock. The home orchestra, Earl Donelson, violin; Wade Zumwalt, cornet; Fred Zumwalt, trombone; Vincent Engeldinger, piano, and O. Phelps, traps, will render selections during the evening.

The building of the library has been under the direction of a committee composed of Dr. F. A. Bailey, chairman, and Councilmen M. H. Stevenson, T. H. Kerr and G. N. Taggart, the funds coming from an appropriation from the Carnegie Foundation. The sum tendered and received by the Hillsboro committee was \$10,000, this being the total expended on building and furnishings, and those who have inspected the completed work and compared it with similar buildings in neighboring cities are unanimous in praising the work of the committee. Wednesday evening will mark the completion of the work of the committee, and the building will be turned over to the city, and then in turn placed in charge of the library board recently appointed by the council.
