

FATHER SUES SALOON FOR BIG DAMAGES

Avers That Colfelt Brothers Sold Liquor While Son was Drunk

SEQUEL OF DEATH OF JOHN WHITE

Asks for sum of Twenty-Two Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars

John White, aged 22 years, son of Mr. and Mrs. S. White, of near Middleton, was killed by a train on the evening of Sept. 9, 1914, and the sequel to the tragedy is a damage suit against J. A. Ed. and Fred Colfelt, brothers, who conduct a saloon at Sherwood.

The complaint says that White started home in an intoxicated condition, and that he was run over by a Portland, Eugene & Eastern passenger train, about five o'clock on September 9, and killed.

White Sr. contends that young White was stupefied by the liquor, and was irresponsible because of its use. The boy contributed about \$30 per month toward the support of the parents. Because of this White Sr. asks the sum of \$22,500.
