filed a mandamus suit against School district No. 9, the school directors being J. L. Batchelder, J. W. Jackson and R. McKnight, clerk. Frank Connell, asking circuit Judge Campbell to issue an order requiring the board of directors to sell bonds in the sum of \$3000 for the purpose of erecting a school building. The bond issue is alleged to have been voted Oct. 24, and the complaint alleges that since that time no move has been made in compliance with the vote, which stipulated 38 yes and 23 no. The paper asks for sale of bonds with reasonable dispatch. The directors do not favor the issue, and allege that the town of North Plains wants the school located over there, and that a \$3,000 structure is more than is needed. The board, it is said, has employed Tongue & Tongue to fight the case at bar. Huston & Huston, of Portland, are attorneys for the plaintiff.

Court adjourned until the new year yesterday, after Judge Campbell had heard all cases crowding the docket. He set Jarvis vs Atlee for trial, Jan 22; the case of Southern vs Hillsboro Telephone Co was brought up, and plaintiff was given to Jan 15 to move for a new trial; Thoman vs Waigrove, set for trial, Jan 20; State vs Callahan, violation of liquor laws, \$50 fine on first indictment, and one year in county jail for second plea of guilty—paroled as to jail sentence upon payment of fine, but must report to sheriff every month for a year; State vs Chas Griffin, like charge, set for trial, Jan 23; State vs Vanday, pleads guilty to violation liquor laws, \$50 on first count, and one year in county jail on each of the remaining two counts. Paroled as to latter two, and paid fine, and must report to sheriff each month. Writ of mandamus ordered issued to school directors of District No 9, to appear and show cause why bonds in sum of \$3000 shall not be sold. Heidel vs Grouman, default and decree.
