Laundry Lines. To insure bluing being evenly distributed add a little salt to the water. If you wish laundered lace to look nice, iron it while quite damp, with creasecloth over it. To set colors in laundering pink, green, aniline red, lavender and purple, use water containing dissolved alum, two ounces to a tub. To restore dingy towels to whiteness put them in a boiler of cold water, add white soap shavings and lemon juice and let them come to a boil. Rinse in tepid water, then blue water. Hang in the sun to dry.

Train and Track. The Canadian Northern will this year build 100 miles of railway between Oliver and St. Paul de Matis, Canadian Northwest.
