If the tax measure just passed becomes a law it should be allowed to remain on the statutes for all time. Change of tax laws is ever a nuisance. There is altogether too much tinkering. The law, as it was a few years ago, with the rebate exception, was a good one. The new law is modeled after it with the rebate left out, and it is to be hoped it will prove satisfactory and permitted to rest without change.

Gov. Withycombe has signed the prohibition bill and it is now a law. That is to say, after next January, it will be a law. The measure permits shipment of beer and whiskey into the state, but the limit is fixed at two quarts of whiskey, or 24 quarts of beer, for any one person, or family. This is quite enough for anyone, and the prohibitionists who favored the bill appear to have a good idea of an average—although this is enough for anyone.
