UNION STOCK YARDS

Receipts for the week have been cattle, 1555; calves, 30; hogs, 4730; sheep, 4243.

There was a good run in the cattle division the first part of the week. Prices breaking somewhat on heavy stuff. Some pulp fed steers brought 8. Good demand for all classes.

Only a fair run of hogs this week. Buyers paid a slightly lower price than the previous week. Prime hogs are quoted at 7 20 to 7 30. There were several loads sold Monday at 7 35, but there has not been any sold since at that price. All Eastern markets are weak.

Sheep house transactions were made quickly. There was some very good stuff on the market which brought top prices. Prime lambs, 8; ewes, 6; yearling wethers, 7. Demand good.

JIM KNOWS BETTER

James Gibson, of Reedville, was in town Saturday. He has been in Washington County since the forties, and he will be 81 years of age, or "81 years young" as he puts it, in April. Speaking of the big interest in high prices, and the statements by the daily press that the highest point has been reached since the advent of the European war, Mr. Gibson says they know nothing about it—and he also criticizes the statement about our cold winter being a marker. He says:

"Why, I've seen flour sell at the old Dille mill, in the early fifties, at \$50 per barrel. We sold flour to the California mines, and in '49 we shipped it South at a "slug" a barrel—a slug was \$50 on the backs of burros, those cantankerous little runts that are a cross between a small mule and a jack rabbit. In 1862 wheat was worth \$5 a bushel, and oats sold at \$2.25 per bushel. And say—talk about cold weather, why, in 1862 we had 5 weeks of sleighing, and I guess I know, for I was a youngster those days, and went sleighing some, myself."

Ethel Galloway, the 15 year daughter of David Galloway, of Banks, was last Thursday adjudged delinquent and ordered sent to the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society, at Portland. The girl's mother is dead, and the father complained that the girl was a persistent truant from school and that she was not truthful. After hearing the evidence the Court decreed that the girl should be under the care of the society rather than be kept at home.
