BIG SCHOOL RALLY AN NORTH PLAINS

Twelve Districts Participate in Educational Rally

EIGHTY-FIVE SCHOOLS ARE SPELLING

And Getting Ready for Annual Event in Hillsboro

The following schools took part in the educational rally held at North Plains, Friday—Leisyville, Columbia, Mountindale, Shady Brook, Meacham, Rock Creek, Helvetia, Arcade, Wallace, North Plains, Pleasant View and Schiefelin. The program consisted of demonstration work by teachers and talks by patrons and directors. Hon. Benton Bowman gave an interesting talk on legislation. Mrs. J. H. Ackerman, of Monmouth, gave an address in the afternoon. The German baseball game was won by the Columbia school. There were about 600 present.

The spelling contest in the grades throughout the county is breaking all previous records. Eighty-five schools have thus far reported, and, from all indications, the Annual event on May Day will see a large gathering of youngsters at Hillsboro, when all pupils who have earned 85 per cent. in the three contests will write 100 words for County Championship Diplomas. Hillsboro has about 270 pupils in the grade contest.

One of the newest schools in the county is Hiteon, District 108, where Miss Elsie Caldwell, the teacher, rejoices because her school has reached the "Standard" mark. Although she has a one-room building, and only a score and two of children, a substantial fund is on hand for a play shed. The board consists of Chas. Vankleek, John Caldwell and Chas. Olson, directors, and Peter Olson, clerk.
