 gon, from the petition of Geo. H. Bag-  
 ley, Guardian of the estate of Alex  
 Beirohr, filed herein, that it is neces-  
 sary, or would be beneficial to Alex  
 Beirohr, that the interest or equity  
 of said Alex Beirohr in the following  
 described real property, to-wit:  
 Situate in the County of Washing-  
 ton and State of Oregon, to-wit: The  
 right to construct and maintain and  
 operate a water ditch and flume reach-  
 ing a distance of 758 degrees, 55'  
 E. 2.98 chains; thence S. 85 1/2 degrees,  
 E. 1.59 chains; thence N. 25 degrees, E.

 of two acres conveyed to J. E. Allen  
 by deed recorded on page 27 of Book  
 52, Records of Deeds of Washington  
 County, Oregon.

Also to construct, maintain and use  
 a dam at the head of the above de-  
 scribed head of ditch across the stream  
 commonly known as Her Creek, also  
 to construct, maintain and use stone  
 age dams above the aforesaid dam on  
 same creek, but not to flood any land
