### Guardian's Citation

IN THE COUNTY COURT OF THE  
STATE OF OREGON FOR WASH-  
INGTON COUNTY.

In the Matter of the Guardianship  
of Alex Beimrohr, an insane person,  
It appearing to the undersigned County  
Judge of Washington County, Ore-  
gon, from the petition of Geo. H. Be-  
imrohr, Guardian of the estate of Alex  
Beimrohr, filed herein, that it is neces-  
sary or would be beneficial to Alex  
Beimrohr, that the interest or equity  
of said Alex Beimrohr in the following  
described real property, to-wit:  
Situate in the County of Washing-  
ton and State of Oregon, to-wit: The  
right to construct and maintain and  
operate a water ditch and flume (each  
6 feet wide) as hereinafter described,  
along the tailing center line, to-wit:  
beginning at a point 18 1/2 chains south  
and 7 1/2 chains east of the quarter  
section corner on the north line of  
Section 7, T. 1 N., R. 4 W., W. 1/2 Sec.  
said beginning point, being the center  
of the head of the said ditch as now  
constructed, running thence along the

41 1/2 chains; thence S. 45 degrees, E.  
1 1/2 chains to a point on the east line  
of my land distant N. 7 1/2 degrees, E.  
9 1/2 chains, from a stone set in the  
contract arise on north line of a tract  
of two acres conveyed to J. F. Allen  
by deed recorded on page 27 of Book  
31, Records of Deeds of Washington  
County, Oregon.

Also appearing to the undersigned  
County Judge, that the said Alex Be-  
imrohr, maintains and uses stor-  
age dams above the aforesaid dam on  
same creek, but not to flood any land  
higher than the present level of water  
in said creek, at my west line, also  
the right to divert all or any portion  
of the water of said Her creek through  
the above described ditch and flume;  
also the right of ingress to and egress  
from said ditch or flume or dam at  
any time over any premises for the  
purpose of repairing or building the  
same, together with the right to use  
such earth, gravel, or stone from the
