## SUPT. CHURCHILL VISITS THE COUNTY

State Official Takes Part in Gaston School Rally

COUNTY SUPT. MAKES MANY VISITS

Mr. Churchill Getting Status of High Schools of State

John A. Johnson, clerk of Dist. No. 67 Jt., Swedeville School, visited the Superintendent's office Monday morning and secured one of the Standard plates for his school. Miss Jennie Beamish is the teacher and has been given a contract for next year.

The school rally held at Gaston last Thursday ended the rally season for his year, and in many ways was the best held in the county. State Supt. Churchill was present in the afternoon and presented the high school problem in a very interesting manner. The school officers had many questions to ask, which goes to show that Gaston may be the nucleus for a standard high school. The schools adjacent to Gaston will no doubt want in on this deal in order to have a high school within reach and to avoid paying the county tax for a high school fund. Supt. S. S. Duncan and Supervisor Ida Mae Smith joined with Supt. Barnes and Supervisor Jas. H. Jack in this rally. About 350 people were present.

The closing exercises of the Sherwood school took place last Saturday. A most excellent program was rendered by the lower grades, after which each member of the eighth grade graduating class took part in a well prepared program. Supt. Barnes presented the diplomas to the class, also the diplomas for those who had been neither absent nor tardy. The Sherwood school has the best report on attendance so far to reach the superintendent's office. After the program the crowd assembled in the city park for a picnic and ball game.

State Supt. Churchill made a flying trip through the county last Friday. He was met at Beaverton by the County Superintendent, and they visited every school along the line as far as Forest Grove. Mr. Churchill was primarily looking after the High Schools that will be affected by the operation of the new law this fall. He reports conditions most favorable. The Forest Grove High School has met all the requirements for a standard school. Mr. Garrett, of the Hillsboro School Board, visited the school with the superintendent. He said that the board would immediately purchase the dictionaries which will place the Hillsboro school on the Standard list.

## Care of the Teeth.

Without good teeth there cannot be proper chewing; without proper chewing there cannot be proper digestion; without proper digestion there cannot be proper nourishment; without proper nourishment there cannot be good health. Without health what is life? Brushing the teeth is not enough for their good health. "It is probable that Washington's life was cut short more by excess of treatment than by disease," the article reads. "It is sometimes said that he died of acute laryngitis, but we believe that it is now generally agreed his disease was diphtheria."

He was first introduced in England by that good sportsman William the Conqueror. Later he was known in France as the St. Hubert and in the eighth century as the Flemish hound. There were no real English bloodhounds in America before those sent over by Edwin Hough to the New York dog show in 1888. The registration of the American Kennel club shows that they were the first imported and registered.
