His many friends regret that J. H. Wescott did not get the position of master game warden—but he made a good fight for it, anyway.

In a few days we shall meet to honor and revere, as well as mourn, our soldier dead. It is well that we are at peace. Europe is now preparing for many memorial days.

Rock hauling awards were made by the county court, Saturday. Alfred Pieren will haul in District 45, for 15c per yard first quarter to \$1 for the 5 mile limit, his nearest competitors; Wolf & Nelson bidding 12c first quarter, to \$1.07 the 20th quarter. Wolf & Nelson were given the hauling in Dist. 37, the bid being 8c for the 1st quarter, up to 4c for the 10th quarter. Henderson was the next lowest. Wolf & Nelson will haul in 19, 10c to \$1.05, 1st to 20th; also 7, 9c to 85c, 1st to 20th. Bids for Districts 5 and 1 were continued. All bids were lower than last year. Ray Reasoner was awarded 4 bridges in Dist. 26 for \$68,224, material furnished by the county, and the Pranger bridge, east of town, for \$198—a 90 foot piling bridge, county to furnish lumber, labor and iron furnished by contractor.

Supt. Barnes has appointed the following as a county educational board—G A Plieth, Sherwood, Route 4; C H Bamford, Forest Grove; J W Goodin, North Plains, and A T Buxton, Forest Grove, and Dr J P Tamiesie and Jos Connell, who were on the former board, asked to be relieved. Rural supervision for four years has proven a success, and the sentiment for a supervisor is practically unanimous. Under the administration of the last four years the county schools have improved wonderfully. One supervisor is selected to help take care of and visit the 112 schools in the county. J. H. Jack has officiated as supervisor, and has given the work conscientious effort.

There was a pleasant gathering at the home of Dr. Bennett-Olden, last evening, the occasion being the birthday of Mrs. Olden and the wedding anniversary of her daughter, Mrs. Hasmer, who is here from Iowa. The afternoon was spent with games and visiting, and delicious refreshments were served. Mirrors to Protect Vault

In constructing a vault in the basement of one of the Los Angeles banks a plan was followed which makes the six sides of the chamber visible to a watchman and eliminates all chances of its being entered by tunneling beneath it. It is set on concrete columns in the middle of a white tiled pit which is brightly illuminated. To make it possible to command a view of the space beneath the vault from the level above mirrors have been arranged on the floor at such an angle that every part of the space is reflected in them. Light is reflected by the white walls so that the top of the vault is illuminated and easily inspected.—Popular Mechanics.

Wonderful Stonework

What is claimed to be the finest stone mason work in the world is to be seen in the ruins of Inca palaces in the city of Cuzco, Peru. Portions of fourteen palaces of Inca rulers line the streets, and much of the walls of the Temple of the Sun has been incorporated into the Church of San Domingo. These walls are of finely cut blocks laid in courses without cement. It has often been said that the joints in this wall will not admit the point of a knife blade. Not only is this true, but a needle, or even a hair, cannot be inserted between these great blocks. The microscope shows that these stones were wrought with tools of chert, an alloy of copper and tin.
