Whether or not there was a genuine attempt to rob the two is a question of doubt in the minds of a number at Sherwood, and some are so uncharitable as to say that they think it was a frame-up to frighten young Vinsonhaler. Cline, however, protested with vehemence that there was no practical joke about it and points to the loss of his tobacco as proof of the highway robbery. 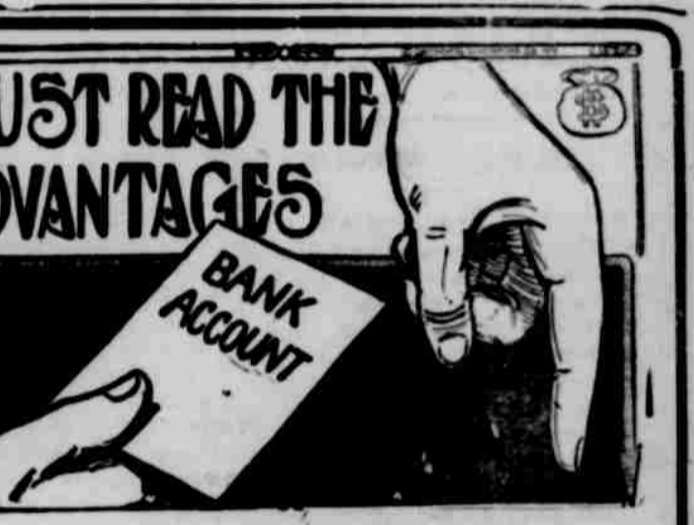
