### Fred Townsend Sentenced to Pay \$1,000, Later Paroled

Following are the proceedings of last Thursday, Friday and Saturday in the Circuit Court before Judge Bagley:

Thursday, July 15—  
Harrington vs Harrington, decree of divorce.

Grand jury reports eight true bills and one not true bill.  
State v J Frank Stroud, not true bill returned, and defendant ordered discharged, and bondsman released.

State v Andrew Schild, arraigned Thos H Tongue appeared for state, and defendant in person in custody of the sheriff.

State v Louis Kastis, arraigned, Thos H Tongue appeared for state, and defendant appeared in person in the custody of the sheriff.

State v Thos M Kennedy, waived arraignment, and plead not guilty to all indictments.

Friday, July 16—  
State v Fred Townsend, arraigned and plead guilty. H T Bagley appeared for defendant, and E B Tongue for the state.

State v Andrew Schild, Benton Bowman appointed attorney for the defendant.

Anna Delude v Nelson Delude, dismissed on motion of plaintiff.

State v Fred Townsend, sentenced to pay a fine of \$1,000, and costs. In default of this sentence, defendant to serve one day in the county jail for each \$2 of the fine. Paroled on condition that he live a life of rectitude, and observe all the laws of the land, and become a law abiding citizen. Defendant not enter into any character of a quarrel or parole will be revoked.

Sheriff Reeves departed Friday morning for Butte, Montana, to get William Daly, who is wanted here for several offenses. Daly is the man who has been doing the bootlegging in Timber, and is charged with selling liquor to minors, on Sunday, and several other offenses of the same nature.

Each was sentenced to pay a fine of \$150 and costs, or in default thereof to serve 75 days in the county jail. ## ANDREW SCHILD GIVEN ANOTHER CHANCE

### Lehmans' Recommend Parole on Conditions of Repay

## TO PAY COUNTY EXTRADITION MONEY

### Extradition Money and Expense to the County is \$300

Andrew Schild, who about a year ago mysteriously disappeared from the Lehman ranch, two or three days after the discovery of a theft of a large sum of money, and was later located in California, and brought here was given a hearing in the Circuit Court last Saturday.

Benton Howman appeared for the defendant, who was sentenced to not less than one nor more than ten years in the state penitentiary. He was paroled on recommendation of Mr. Lehman, on condition that he repay to the county the costs of this action and of his extradition, which totals \$100, payment to be made at the rate of \$20 monthly, to be payable the first of each month, with first payment Sept. 1. He must also repay the money stolen from Mr. Lehman, at the rate of \$50 per month. He must not leave this county, and must report by letter to the sheriff by the first and fifteenth of each month, telling what he is doing, where he is, and how much he is earning. In case he violates any of these conditions parole will be revoked and sentence served.
