

SUCCESSFUL TERM OF CIRCUIT COURT

Fines Collected Since July 6, Amount to \$1850

NUMBER CIVIL CASES HEARD

Also Disposed of Fifty-Three Criminal Cases

Those who were opposed to formation of a new judicial court, under the supposition that it would prove more costly to tax payers of the county, are interesting to know under Judge Geo. R. Bagley's first term of office there have been disposed of July 6 fifty-three criminal cases, not to mention the cases heard. The grand jury returned 38 true bills, and 45 have been disposed of. There has been paid in the fines since July 6, besides costs, of which the county secures practically all benefit. For deducting expenses of cases, both petit and grand, a nice surplus is left to the old regime this was of, owing to the amount to be disposed of by one. The taxpayers were then called to pay out a great deal for the board of prison in the county jail, because impossible to try them as it is now.

ERNEST BREJLE KILLED IN AN AUTO ACCIDENT

Drives Machine off Ten-Foot Hill Near the J. E. Reeves Farm

WAS ALONE AT TIME OF ACCIDENT

Was Found Dead This Morning by Mr. Hughes, Who was on his Way to Work

Ernest Brejle, aged about 35 years, who lived in Blooming, was found dead, crushed under his machine, by Mr. Hughes, who was on his way to work, at 7 o'clock this morning.

Mr. Brejle was alone and no one knows exactly what time the accident occurred. He was last seen about midnight, at which time he was on his way home. He was driving his 5-passenger Michigan car, and by some unknown circumstances, plunged from the road, the car turning over, nailing him by the chest to the earth.

Before approaching the bridge, which crosses the Tualatin river, there is a ten-foot hill. The machine was going from one side of the road to the other before leaving the fill, as if he had lost control of the car, probably by the breaking of the steering gear.

He is survived by his wife, who was formerly Miss Muhlly, and six children.

PATRICK BERRY, OF BEAVERTON, ROBBED

Had Befriended a Stranger Who Was Penniless

TOOK PURSE WITH ALL CONTENTS

Was Knocked Down With Club or Slingshot

After having befriended a stranger, who was penniless, by having furnished him with a bed and something to eat, Patrick Berry, who works for the Southern Pacific, was assaulted and robbed by his companion in Beaverton, Tuesday night. Mr. Berry says that his assailant struck him with a club or slingshot and knocked him down and robbed him of all his money.

Mr. Berry describes the thug as being about six feet tall, smooth shaven and weighing about 190 pounds. He was dressed in dark suit, black shirt and tie and black slouch hat.
