Max Leavitt, the Metzler junk dealer, was Friday taken to the asylum. Leavitt is a Russian Jew, aged 37 years, and the evidence was that he was unreasonably jealous of his wife. In his tantrums he froths at the mouth and attacks his wife, choking her until she is black in the face. At that he appears to be violently in love with her, although he exhibits rather a poor way of showing it. In his "spells," he butts his head against the wall. He has been afflicted with the paranoia for about two years, and a course of treatment at the asylum may bring him out all right. His wife and brother were up Friday to witness his departure to the State Hospital.

## RAINS CAME TIMELY FOR THE POTATOES

Have Not Seriously Interfered With the Hop Harvest

MEANS THOUSANDS FOR FARMERS

Another Week of Dry Weather and Hill Speds Would Have Failed

The rains which broke the end of the week have been of thousands of dollars of value to those who have potatoes planted and growing in the hills of Washington County, and by the same token, on the plains and lowlands. The vines were getting mighty weakly, and the moisture will mean a big increase in the prospective crop. Kale, too, has been vastly benefited, and many fields of this forage would have amounted to nothing but for the timely appearance of Jupiter Pluvius. The rain did not materially interfere with the hop harvest as the majority of the yards were through. A few belated yards, here and there, kept picking through the bad weather in order to finish Saturday or Monday. Vegetables of all kinds that have not yet matured were benefited by the precipitation, and as one farmer, from the hills, said: "I feel mighty good, for the rainfall came just in time. All of our potatoes in the hill districts are planted late, and the vines are yet green. They were begging for rain for two weeks before it came—but now that it is here it will mean thousands of dollars for us in the aggregate."

## COURT SAYS GABRIEL MARTY NOT INSANE

Swiss, Aged 87 Years, Examined Before Judge Roscoe

WAS OFFICER IN SWISS ARMY

Testimony Was That Old Gentleman Frequently Became Enraged

Gabriel Marty, aged 87 years, was brought to Hillsboro Friday, and examined Saturday on matters relating to his sanity. Dr. Bailey examined the patient, but found nothing to warrant sending him to the state hospital. Marty was in the asylum several years ago, but was released as cured. The old gentleman's wife died a year or so ago, and since that time he has been a little querulous, and also has fits of violent temper. Aside from this he appears to be a very bright old man, and he was candid in saying that his son Emil, with whom he lives, and who treats him right, "but will not do what I want him to do some times, and I think I have the right to scold him." Marty was at one time an officer in the Swiss Landwehr, and he is well read on the scriptures, history, etc. A few years ago while spraying trees, he lost the sight of an eye and this makes him appear awkward. His mental faculties, outside of his disagreements at home, appear to be pretty well balanced—much better in fact than many of ten years less age. The court advised that the old gentleman remain at the hotel for a few days until some final disposition is made of the case.

## NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS

You are hereby notified that the second half payment of your tax will be due on or before September 30th, 1915. Beginning October 1st, 1915, said tax will become delinquent and a penalty of 10 per cent, and interest at the rate of 10 per cent, per annum will be added, until paid. Where no part of the tax has been paid, a penalty of 1 per cent, per month for each calendar month or fraction thereof of delinquency during the period beginning April 1st, 1915, and ending August 31st, 1915. On September 1st, 1915, a penalty of 10 per cent, replaces the cumulative penalty heretofore charged, and further interest at the rate of 10 per cent, per annum from September 1st, 1915, is added. On or as soon as possible after October 5th, 1915, the tax collector shall proceed to collect all taxes upon personal property, which shall not have been paid before said October 5th, 1915, together with penalty and interest, and shall levy on and take said personal property into his possession, or so much thereof as to satisfy said tax, and sell the same at public auction, or he may charge the tax on personal property against real property, and said tax shall be in lien on said real property and shall be enforced in the same manner as other real estate taxes.
