**LAST POMONA GRANGE A SPLENDID MEETING**

Large Crowd of Strangers Enjoy Day at County Seat

GRAINS & GRASSES DECORATE HALL

Patrons of Husbandry Celebrate Close of Bounteous Season

Wednesday, Oct. 27th, Washington County Pomona Grange met with Hillsboro Grange for the last quarterly meeting of the year. The crowds arriving in Hillsboro on the S. P. and Oregon Electric trains in the morning were met by the reception committee and conducted to the Hall, which was tastefully decorated with Autumn leaves and the grains and grasses from the County Fair exhibit of the local Grange. A fine new piano, the result of making the exhibit at the Fair, was in evidence.

After the routine business of the morning all repaired to the dining-room, where a bountiful spread of all the good things to eat from the farm, orchard and garden, had been prepared by the ladies of this Grange.

The afternoon session was opened with music, followed by an address by Rev. Myron L. Booser, of Orenco, his subject being, "The Development of Social Conditions in the Rural Districts." The speaker held the close attention of his audience for an hour. He urged that the home be centered around good, clean literature and music, and a revival of common interests be made in the country school house.

Wm. Schulmerich was the next speaker. His subject was "Ensilage and the construction of the Silo." His talk was instructive and interesting and called forth many questions.

The question "Are we Ready to Undertake the Construction of State Highways in the County, and if so, What Roads Should be Selected for the Improvement?" was then discussed and called forth a lively response from all over the audience, and the following resolution was presented: "Resolved, that this meeting go on record as opposed to the levying of a tax for the purpose of hard surfacing any road in the county." This resolution was adopted with one or two opposing votes. The meeting being composed of representative farmers and taxpayers from all sections of the county, the adoption of the resolution is taken as evidence of the sentiment of the farmers throughout the county.

At the evening session a class of about sixteen was shown the mysteries of the Fifth or Pomona degree. After Pomona's feast the little daughters of some of the members rendered a most excellent program, which speaks well for the future of Hillsboro Grange.
