## NEW LIQUOR LAW IS FULL OF GAMBOCKS

Little Classes in Affidavit to Making Some Sit up and Take Notice MUST SWEAR IS FOR SACRAMENT Only Evades, Therefore, in That It is Liberate to Gods, in Pevnia

The new liquor law, which goes into force January 1 is giving the users of the stuff considerable apprehension these days. Some of the provisions are more than peculiar. For instance, the law prescribes an affidavit for common carriers, and it is not likely that they will ignore the form which the carrier must use, and to which the consignee must swear before liquor is delivered, for there is some heavy penalty for violation. The form says that one, before receiving liquor from a common carrier must swear that "said liquor is to be used for sacramental purposes only." A little further on the law says that one can be prosecuted for perjury under the general laws if he swears falsely.

About the only way the general run of shippers or consignees could get away with this affidavit is to copy after the ancient parsians, who before taking a "swig," always poured a few drops on the ground as a "libation" to the gods of their faith.

Attorneys, however, say that if this particular part of the law goes to the Supreme Court that tribunal will take the statute by all four corners and decide as to the intent, which is clearly that every four weeks persons over 21, who are not habitual drunkards, can get 34 quarts of beer—or 2 quarts of spirituous liquor.

Another feature of the law is that no newspaper can, after Jan. 1, advertise any liquor business, nor can any liquor advertisements be sent through the mails, or posted on bill boards. This, however, will not keep outside houses from sending liquor lists through the mails, for that is an inter-state matter.

When liquor is shipped through express companies the consignee can not transfer his bill of lading, but must receipt himself. No bank can handle any draft accompanying the bill of lading, so this makes it an absolutely cash business—a good thing for the liquor sellers.

Under the new law one can't keep any liquor in a club room in a locker, nor can he give it away. Liquor cannot be carried to any dance or public gathering. If one does he is liable to not more than 300 fine or 180 days in the county jail. The statute makes any consignee who violates the law also subject to penalty.

## JACK CASTOR, SAFE CRACKER, IS CAUGHT

Taken in Raid in Shack in East Portland by the Detectives

TWO OTHERS CAUGHT WITH HIM

Merchandise Stolen From Mays Bros. Store, North Plains, Found

The officers have landed three hard characters, Jack Castor, Earl Braun and Jimmy Sullivan, the trio being picked up in a raid in East Portland, Thanksgiving morning, by Detectives Goltz, Tackaberry, Coleman, Snow and Hellyer. A woman, living near the shack, had reported that she had noticed the trio going and coming with sacks evidently filled with plunder, and the detective force planned a raid Wednesday evening. They concluded, however, to wait until early morning. When they rushed the shack they found the three men asleep. One of them, however, had a gun close at hand, and reached for it, but it was too late, as the officers had them covered. The shack was investigated and the detectives found a lot of plunder, a portion of which was stolen from the Mays Bros. Store, on a week ago Saturday night. Just as soon as Sheriff Reeves was notified of the robbery he had Elmer Mays phone a list of missing merchandise to him and he then notified the Portland police.

Just as soon as shoes, suits and overcoats were seen by the detectives they realized that they had made a capture worth while. Sullivan owns the shack, and was providing the "fence" for the plunder. He says he was not at North Plains, and it is probable that his statement is true. He will go with the bunch, however. All have unsavory records and have served time.

Castor was wearing a coat belonging to one of the suits taken, and a peculiar collar mark afforded easy identification by Mr. Mays.

Castor is an old offender, but his inclination does not as a rule run to robbing stores of merchandise. He is an expert safe operator, it is said, and he generally operates alone. Castor slips out alone, walks to the town he wishes to operate in, reaches it after dark, and then blows the safe in some store or postoffice, after which he makes his getaway in the night.

It is thought that he was the one who blew the Gregerson & Kilberg safe at Huxton, a few months ago, and also the Cherry Grove safe in the post office. He has served time, and is known as one of the coolest of safe crackers. The detectives found a lot of "soup," which is known as nitro, in correct parlance. This is the stuff used by safe blowers.

The shoes were found to tally with the list of plunder taken from the store and the identification is as complete as possible. Sheriff Reeves quick sending of a list of the plunder was a master stroke, for it afforded the detectives something to act upon. All three men are now in jail.

The goods recovered were 16 pairs shoes, 2 suits, 3 overcoats, some underwear and socks. Nearly half of the loot was missing, and the burglars were wearing underwear, shoes and overcoats.
