Washing In the Philippines.

Most of the laundry work of the Philippine islands is done by hand. The washing is usually done by beating the clothes with puddles, with the open hands or by rolling the garment slightly and striking one end of it opon a flat stone or other hard, smooth surface, handling it as a flail is swung over the shoulder. The usual method is to beat the clothes with paddies especially fashioned for the purpose. There is no such thing as boiling in the process of washing among the Filipines. Much of the clothing worn in the country being white, a great deal of sun bleaching is done.

Maro is the Japanese word for mother.
