SHERIFF MAKES TRIPS TO SALEM THIS WEEK

Bondshu Landed at Penitentiary Yesterday, Schild, Tomorrow

YOUNG MAN GETS NO LENIENCY

Must Serve Time for Former Theft of Money From Lehman, of Cedar Mill

Sheriff Reeves has kept the trail between Hillsboro and Salem warm this week, and goes again tomorrow, taking with him Andrew Schild, who robbed John Yost of \$8 a few nights ago. Schild was sentenced to a term last July, but was paroled. Violation of the parole appeared to have done the young fellow no benefit, for as soon as he filed up on hard cider he couldn't resist the temptation to steal.

Judge Bagley revoked the parole Wednesday, and he will join the colony at the state institution.

The first of the week Kaster and Brown were taken to the capital, and yesterday Reeves entered Bondshu in the pen.

Young Johnston, of Forest Grove, was turned over to the Boys Training School—and this leaves the jail but a couple of tenants.

From information received at Salem it looks as though Ulrich Hertzog will soon be released. He is a model prisoner, and his Beaverton friends are anxiously awaiting the time when he will have served his minimum, which will be shortly. He has gained time on good behavior.

LIBRARY

The secretary of the Carnegie Library has submitted his annual report to the council, covering conduct of the institution since March 15. Books commenced to circulate June 1, and the library has been kept open evenings from 7:30 to 9:30, excepting Sundays. Attendance has been 6,448; borrowers, 236, with volumes issued at 2,874; books available at present for circulation, 495, with 176 more loaned by the state. MILD WINTER GRIPS OREGON COUNTRY

Snow Falls to Depth of Four and Half Inches all Over Valley

FREEZING TEMPERATURE PREVAILS

Sleigh Bells Jingle all Over the Tualatin Plains Past Week

Old King Winter visited Oregon the past week, and the end apparently is not yet, for snow is still falling at intervals. A good stiff freeze prevailed all of last week, and snow fell by the end of the week so that many sleighs were brought into requisition. The temperature was not low enough, however, to cause any material damage to water pipes. With the wind in the north and east the grip caught the congealed pools which were shallow, and in places there was skating until the snow fell.

At no time, however, has the thermometer gone over 20 below freezing, and no one has suffered from the cold. Woodpiles have been depleted and the wood dealers were kept busy since the middle of last week.

The young people have enjoyed the winter immensely, many sleighing parties having made the evenings merry with trips where roads were good. Since the freeze the auto has also been out, for there has been a good surface on all country roads.

No damage has resulted in the farm districts, for the snowfall has kept the potatoes from freezing.

JOHN KIENI

John Kieni died at the Kieni ranch, near Cedar Mill, Jan. 1, 1916, after an illness of several weeks from heart trouble and dropsy. He was born in Waupun, Wis., and was aged 64 years, 10 months and 30 days. He came to Oregon over 30 years ago. His parents died here and their remains are buried at the union cemetery, near Cedar Mill. For some years he has resided with a brother, Geo. Kieni, and an uncle, Anton Barunder. A sister, Mrs. Mary Hirscher, resides at Waupun. Wia. Kieni was a member of the German Reformed Church, and was devoted to the institution. He was a man of excellent habits, and while more than charitable, kept his donations under cover. His property and collateral are worth in the neighborhood of perhaps \$80,000.

The funeral took place yesterday, at 1:00 o'clock from the house, and interment was in the Union cemetery, by the side of his parents.
