His wife resides on small tract close to the Plith place, and a small mortgage will be paid off by friends for a home in the clear for the wife and children.

Secretary of State Ben Olcott submits his auto and chauffeur license report for 1915. Washington County paid the state the sum of \$2,659, and received back from the state, for the benefit of the county road fund, the sum of \$2,130.25. But nine counties pay more to the state, which speaks well for the Tualatin country. Yamhill holds a little over us, having paid in \$2,713.50 and having received back from the state the sum of \$2,173.91. Total receipts for the state at large were \$108,881.50 and the cost of plates, collections, clerk hire, etc., was \$21,651.42—a modest profit.

TWO HOUSES BURN ON
MONDAY AFTERNOON

Big Boarding House at Orenco, Occupied by N. H. Shiedel, Lost

EDW. SCHULMERICH'S HOUSE HERE

Department damaged by Snow on Streets

Fire Big Breakway

Two houses burned Monday afternoon, one being the big boarding house belonging to the Orenco Nursery, a quarter mile North of Orenco station, and the other being the home of Edw. Schulmerich, on Sixth and Main, Hillsboro.

The Orenco boarding house, occupied by N. H. Shiedel and family, caught shortly after the noon hour, from a boarder's room and when the blaze was discovered it was too late to do any effective firefighting. The contents of the lower floor, however, were saved, but all the bedding and furniture in the upper story was a total loss. The McMinville Fire & Relief held insurance on both the house and contents. Agent Dwyer went to Orenco, Tuesday, to look over the loss.

The Ed. Schulmerich home caught fire about 3:30 in the afternoon, supposedly from a defective flue. By the time the department reached Sixth & Main the building was too far gone. The snow retarded the apparatus, the team having all it could do to take the big wagon along at a trot. A defective flue was assigned as the cause. This was the third time this building had caught, and only prompt action by neighbors saved the furniture on the lower floor.

The house was a good one, and had been modernized by Mr. Schulmerich. It was built about 25 years ago by the late J. J. Morgan. Mr. and Mrs. Roy Schulmerich have been living in the place, and when in town the Ed. Schulmerich family also made it their home. There was no insurance.

MRS. POLLY BUTLER

Mrs. Polly Butler, widow of the late Isaac Butler, died at the family home in Hillsboro, Jan. 17, 1916, after an illness of several days. Her maiden name was Polly Caroline Tidwell, and she was born near Carmi, Ill., Dec. 9, 1840. At the age of six years she crossed the plains with her parents and settled near Oregon City. In 1856 she was married to James H. Moore, a pioneer of 1832. To them were born three children, two dying in infancy. The surviving child is Mrs. W. H. McElowney, now a resident of Forest Grove. Mr. Moore died in 1881. She married Isaac Butler, a pioneer of 1845, in 1859. To this union five children were born, Miss Hattie, Mark and Fred, all of whom have passed, and J. E. Butler, a resident of Portland, and Miss Lottie Butler, at home.

Of the Butler children, to all of whom she gave a mother's love, she is survived by George, of Hillsboro, Thomas, North Yakima; Wm., of Hornbrook, Cal.; Ben, of Arizona; Mrs. Alonzo Sigler, Mrs. Jas. Sigler, and Mrs. C. R. Boyd, Hillsboro; Mrs. Sarah Hoopengartner, Portland, and Mrs. Emeline Berjman, of China, Cal. Of her immediate family she leaves the following half-brothers and half-sisters: Mrs. Susan Johnson, McMinnville; Mrs. Thos. Fowler, Forest Grove; Mrs. Jane Moore, Portland; Mrs. Henry Carstens, of Banks; Mrs. Benton Wilson, Bull Run, and Jas. Wilson, of Forest Grove.

The funeral took place today, at 2 o'clock. Mrs. Butler was a helpful, womanly woman, and was highly esteemed by a large circle of friends.

Cattle—With a liberal supply of 1235 head on hand the market did not do as well as the previous week. A couple loads of pulp fed steers brought 7.75 and one load of cows brought 6.20. Hogs—Another jump in hog prices. With 5250 head on hand the market made a sensational advance and set the top at 7.25 cents over last week's top. Bulk of stuff went at 7.10. Quality was very good.

Sheep remained on a steady basis at the North Portland market this morning with lambs selling at 8.25; ewes at 6.55. A total of 2550 sheep were counted in. Market is closing very strong.

TILLAMOOK LINE IS
IN SLIDE BLOCKADE

Service Expected Before Some Time During Next Week

UN TO TIMBER TRI-WEEKLY ONLY

Slides Bring Down Avalanche of Rock

With Saw of Great Depth

Train service has been abandoned between Hillsboro and Tillamook and service will not be resumed until some time next week, and perhaps not then. A force of men has been sent out, with a steam shovel and two locomotives to clear the track, where avalanches of snow have brought down boulders so large that railway men doubt a crane can move them; believing it will be necessary to blast before the obstructions can be removed.

The track is so closed that the trains from either end are several miles from the other. Trains from Hillsboro to Tillamook will be run every other day, leaving Hillsboro Mondays, Tuesdays and Fridays and returning the alternate days.

Should the weather moderate rapidly the chances are that there will be further slides on the Tillamook line, and it may be several weeks before the road will be opened to traffic.

This branch of the S. P. is one that invariably has given trouble, and until the company expends thousands of dollars the same conditions will prevail for years.

WILLIAM M. STEPHENS

William M. Stephens, pioneer and Indian War Veteran, died at his home in Forest Grove, Jan. 18, 1916. He was born in Hanover, Indiana, in 1831, and later moved to Iowa. He crossed the plains to Oregon in 1845, and the family settled in Polk Co. He was married to Elizabeth DeLashmuth, Aug. 22, 1861. They moved to Buxton in 1864. Mr. Stephens served as an Indian War Veteran in Co. H, Oregon's First regiment.

Besides the widow, he leaves the following children: Mrs. J. F. Carstens and Chas. Stephens, of Banks; Edmond Stephens, of Timber; Alfred Stephens, of Buxton; Mrs. Ida Allen, Vernon; Fred Stephens, Forest Grove. A half-brother, Samuel Stephens, resides in Hillsboro. Two brothers, John and Henry, settled in Pacific Co., Wash., near Willapa, in the early days.

The funeral was held at Forest Grove today, interment being in Forest View Cemetery.
