The next spraying is for scab. You have noticed the black spots that make the apple so unsightly—practically unsalable. For this I use one t gal, of time and sulphur to 35 parts of water. Spray when the cluster opens sad the blossoms showe pink, or rather when they are in a ball, but not open. This is the first scab spraying. The next is when the petals have fallen. Now be sure they are off the trees.
