### A CORRECTION

Fruit growers will please note that in line 45 of the article on spraying, published last week, the word "scale" should have been "scab." The article from this should read:

The next spraying is for scab. You have noticed the black spots that make the apple so unsightly—practically unsalable. For this I use one t. gal. of lime and sulphur to 35 parts of water. Spray when the cluster opens and the blossoms show pink, or rather when they are in a ball, but not open. This is the first scab spraying. The next is when the petals have fallen. Now be sure they are off the trees.
