Ancient Basket Makers.

The Worshipful Company of Basket Makers dates back to 1500, but basket making was a recognized craft in London more than a century before then. In 1403 basket makers "and other forgers" were banished by the common council to the old manor of Blanche Appletton, and in 1538 even those English basket makers who were still permitted to live in the city were similarly dealt with, on account of their indifference to the danger from fire.—London Chronicle.

Rock Salt and Gypsum.

Beds of rock salt and gypsum occur in large areas in the United States. They are found in the salina rocks of New York and Pennsylvania and in other formations of about the same age laid down in Michigan and Ohio during periods of great aridity. In southeastern Michigan a bed of rock salt 600 feet thick is said to have been found by drill holes. Dense limes or salt deposits are found in carboniferous strata in West Virginia and other eastern states, in the "red beds" of the southwest and the Rocky mountains, in the cretaceous deposits of several of the western states and in the tertiary strata of the far southwest.—Argonaut.

Light From Broken Crystals.

It has been noticed that a soft bluish light has occasionally been seen when a scoop was scraped across solidly caked sugar in the bin. Loose sugar does not show this glow, nor does granulated. The cause of the peculiar light is in the fracturing of the sugar crystals. Luminescence of this type accompanies the breaking of crystals of a number of different substances, but is none is more pronounced than in rock candy. To get the best effect place lumps of rock candy between the jaws of nutcrackers or forceps and suddenly crush the crystal to fragments. If the room has previously been darkened the flash of light may be seen at a distance of twenty yards.
